Call to Order:

Meeting was called to order at 1:00PM by Supervisor Donnelly.

*The checks that were turned in for scrap metal have been set aside in a special account for Army Surplus purchases.

*Highway Superintendent McAdams requested permission to rent a lift for two days for fixing the fire alarm, cleaning the doors, and patching the roof of the salt building.

*The Fire Alarm Systems were discussed. The Platinum plan was agreed upon because it will cover everything at no additional cost, all inclusive.

*The rental of a mower was discussed. Our current mower would take a week to do what this mower could in a day. Our mower is really for brush. The state has said all roads have to be mowed. Highway Superintendent McAdams requested permission to rent it for a month. There will be no additional insurance cost to the town. Councilman Grommeck requested that McAdams look into how much the mower part would be that he will be renting. Perhaps it would more cost effective in the long run to buy one instead of having to rent it every year.

*Councilman Gladstone discussed whether or not it would be cheaper to have someone

haul material in than to haul it ourselves, gravel, etc. He requested that McAdams do a cost analysis to determine what the difference would be. McAdams agreed to do this.

* McAdams also brought up the sweeper. He asked if he should take it for junk or bring it back to the highway garage. Councilman Liddle stated that it probably wasn't worth fixing. The board agreed to take the sweeper for junk and for McAdams to keep his eyes out for a new one through the Army Surplus.

*The Tremperskill Store has decided they do not want to be a steam cleaning station, so Supervisor Donnelly put Don Hogan's name in, the plans are going along the way they expected.

*On April 19, 2012 Bud and Alex Adelson will be attending the scenic byway meeting at the Shandaken Town Hall at 10am.

* Supervisor Donnelly would like the boards ok to enroll the Town employees in a new no cost to the Town or our employees, vision care program. This is being offered by the County's Insurance brokers.

* Supervisor Donnelly received a check #14110 from Mike in the amount of \$1108.58. It has been deposited in our funds from scrap metal and allows us to take advantage of the surplus equipment that becomes available to us.

*Supervisor Donnelly received check #1168 from Margaret in the amount of \$2532.82 for March penalties and the February and March interest owed to the town.

*Hunter's Town Highway Garage, 8 truck bays and small office and restrooms has cut their oil usage by 54% with their pellet furnace. Councilman Liddle asked if this report was from this last heating season and asked Supervisor Donnelly to find out about this.

*NYC DEP has repealed its rules as they apply to permit fees to all watershed towns for use of NYC land in Delaware County, Dutchess, Greene, Orange, Putnam, Schoharie, Sullivan, Ulster, and Westchester Counties. The fees will no longer apply.

*Clark Companies are doing a very good job on High St, it should be done soon.

*\$3000 in General fund from Healthy Heart Fund that was raised by Jennifer Finkle.- \$1500 will stay in Healthy Heart to update the equipment at the school and \$1500 will go to Andes Trails to improve trails.

This Negative Declaration has been prepared in compliance with the requirements of the City Environmental Quality Review (CEQR) process as set forth in Executive Order 91 of 1977 and amendments, and Article 8 of the Environmental Conservation Law establishing the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA) and its regulations as set forth in 6NYCRR Part 617. The New York City Department of Environmental Protection (NYCDEP), as lead agency, had determined that the proposed action described below would not have a significant effect on the environment and is herein publishing a Negative Declaration. The Environmental Assessment Form (EAF) was issued on November 7, 2011

Project Description

The New York City Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) is proposing to repeal and reenact Title 15, Chapter 17 of the Rules of the City of New York (RCNY), the existing rules governing the Issuance of Revocable Land Use Permits for the Occupation or Use of City Property (Existing Rules). The Proposed Rules would apply to any Permitted occupation or use of New York City property (lands, waterbodies, reservoirs and infrastructure) in the counties of Delaware, Dutchess, Greene, Orange, Putnam, Schoharie, Sullivan, Ulster, and Westchester. These rules are for the benefit of municipalities, utilities, government agencies, organizations exempt from Federal taxation pursuant to IRC ("Internal Revenue Code") §501(c)(3), individuals and commercial enterprises who may wish access over or to occupy City owned property. DEP would be the City agency designated as the issuing authority for Revocable Land Use Permits ("Permits")

The purposes of the proposed repeal and re-promulgation of the Rules for the Issuance of Revocable Land Use Permits for the Occupancy or Use of City Property include:

- to provide a more user-friendly format;
- to clarify the application process;
- to establish a new section that covers the term and renewal of the Revocable Land Use Permit;
- to establish a category of applicants for which the application and permit fees will be waived, and remove the Commissioner's discretion to waive fees only for entities that provide services to NYC-owned facilities;
- to require that permittees supply a surety bond when siting major infrastructure improvements on City property. The surety bond will cover the cost of any repairs or remediation made necessary by:
 - a permittee's use of City property; and
 - the removal of such improvements and restoration of the property in case the permittee abandons those improvements after DEP revokes or terminates the permit.

The proposed rule also allows DEP the opportunity to perform such repairs, remediation or removal itself based on the nature and location of the repair, remediation or removal at issue.

- to provide 30 days' notice prior to revocation to give the permittee the opportunity to resolve the problem underlying the proposed revocation;
- to reorganize the fee schedule into table format and to differentiate between Commercial and Non-Commercial fees to make the fee schedule easier to understand;

The proposed action requires promulgation pursuant to authority granted to the Commissioner of the Department of Environmental Protection as set forth in sections 24-308, 24-309, 24-310, 24-332, 24-334, 24-337, 24-342, and 24-346 of the Administrative Code of the City of New York. The proposed action also requires approval according to the City Administrative Procedure Act (CAPA). No State or Federal approvals are required to implement the proposed action.

The Bureau of Environmental Planning and Analysis has concluded that the proposed action is classified as a Type I Action

Modifications to the Proposed Amendments as a Result of the Public Review Process

Reference to adjustment of fees annually based on Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) was removed from the Proposed Rules. Fees would not be raised automatically annually based on COLA since COLA is not directly tied to DEP administrative costs. For future fee increases, a cost analysis would be performed to support future amendments to the Rules, which would be subject to a new environmental review. The Proposed Rules were also clarified to indicate that when a permit has expired and DEP agrees to allow the former permittee to undertake restoration of the site, a new permit must be secured for such restoration work. The proposed increase in permit fees have been minimal and are not anticipated to place a substantial burden on applicants, and future increases as stated above would be subject to another environmental review. Water connections were removed from the list of improvements requiring a surety bond, which would reduce any economic burden for this activity.

Therefore, the proposed modifications are not anticipated to have any significant adverse environmental or socioeconomic impacts.

STATEMENT OF NO SIGNIFICANT EFFECT

DEP has determined that, the Proposed Repeal and Reenactment of the Rules for the Issuance of Revocable Land Use Permits for the Occupancy or Use of City Property and the modifications listed above are not anticipated to have any potential significant adverse impacts on the quality of the environment. No significant adverse impacts are anticipated to occur with respect to natural resources, socioeconomic conditions, growth, community character, aesthetic resources, air quality, noise, traffic and parking, public health and safety, hazardous materials, water supply infrastructure, or construction. These conclusions are based on the EAF distributed on November 7, 2011.


Supporting Statements

DEP aims for smooth sailing with Pepacton boating program

Guidelines being formulated for recreational use

The Pepacton Boating Steering committee met last Friday to discuss the opening of the Pepacton Reservoir to kayaking, canoeing, rowboats, small sailboats and sculls.

The reservoir will be opened for non-motorized crafts on May 25. The boating season will extend through October 8. An official kick-off celebration is being planned on Thursday, May 24 on the north side of Shavertown Bridge (off Tremperskill Road, just west of the intersection with Route 30).

Launch sites

In addition to the Shavertown Bridge location, boat launch sites will be established in the Town of Colchester at Raynard Brook, NYC Road 1, not far from the dam, and in the Town of Middletown at the Old Arena site, at mouth of the Millbrook stream on NYC Road 10.

Public boating on the Pepacton Reservoir will require participants to obtain a use permit. These permits will be available for free from DEP website or from an authorized boat cleaning vendor. Steam cleaning of boats will be a requirement to prevent the spread of invasive species like zebra mussels. Cleaning stations will be established and vendors typically charge \$10-\$15 for this service.

To ensure that boats have been properly cleaned,

dated stickers will be issued to indicate whether it's a short-term (up to one week) or long-term (for the season) permit. The stickers will also indicate from which launch site the boat will be put into the water. Failure to have a boat properly cleaned may result in penalties.

"The boat and associated equipment could be confiscated and a fine could be applied. The individual may also have the DEP access permit suspended or cancelled," DEP spokesman Farrell Sklerov told the *News*.

There is a meeting on Thursday, March 8 from 6-8 p.m. at the DEP office in Downsville for prospective vendors who may be interesting in boat cleaning work.

Leaving boats behind

Owners of rowboats used for reservoir fishing often leave their boats chained to trees on the reservoir banks. DEP officials have indicated that owners of canoes, kayaks and sailboats will be allowed to secure their crafts at the Pepacton in similar fashion. DEP officials are contemplating adding boat racks, at some point.

Mr. Sklerov said that many of the Pepacton rules will be modeled after the Cannonsville project.

"Several different types of watercraft including kayaks, canoes, rowboats, sculls and sailboats may be used and launched from several specified sites around the reservoir. Canoes, sculls, sailboats with removable center/dagger

boards and rowboats must be at least 11-feet five-inches in length and kayaks must be at least nine feet in length. Boats also must be able to be walked into the water," he explained.

DEP officials said they don't anticipate adding any safety personnel and will utilize current patrols for these duties. Local first responder corps are involved in the process and a special meeting will be scheduled to address their questions and concerns. Local emergency squads currently have a protocol for response in emergencies involving boaters/anglers.

Officials attended

Those attending Friday's meeting included Andes Supervisor Marty Donnelly, Colchester Supervisor Theodore Fonda, Middletown Supervisor Marge Miller and representatives from the DEP, state Department of Environmental Conservation, the Catskill Watershed Corporation, the Central Catskill Chamber of Commerce and the East Branch Access Committee.

The DEP announced the opening of the Pepacton Reservoir for recreational boating last month. The expanded use of the Pepacton follows the successful three-year pilot program on the Cannonsville Reservoir in western Delaware County.

Additional program guidelines are being established and will be announced shortly, DEP officials said.
