Call to Order:

The public hearing was called to order at 12:45PM by Supervisor Donnelly.

Pledge:

The pledge of allegiance was led and recited by Councilman Grommeck.

Public Comment:

Noise Ordinance-

Sharon Drew of Gladstone Hollow Road- What were the complaints and how many were there? Why did the board decide to look into the ordinance?

Supervisor Donnelly answered this to say that over the past four or five years, maybe longer there were a ½ a dozen or a dozen complaints of constant noise in certain areas. This concern was brought to the Town Attorney. He drafted the law. It was sent to Sheriff Mills to see whether or not it was enforceable and he said it was.

Elaine Geller of Beaver Creek Hollow Road- In favor of the local law. Lives near Camp Nubar. She stated that she has spoken to the camp on numerous occasions and they have not altered their noise level or been interested in her concerns.

Rob Laing of Gladstone Hollow Road- Opposed to the local law. Stated that NYS has a 'disturbing the peace' law already and anyone with a noise issue should call the Sheriff's department or the State Troopers and report the incident.

Sherab Posel of Blazing Wisdom Institute on Fall Clove Road- In favor of the local law. Mr. Posel gave the board a list of suggested changes to the law. He has called the Sheriff's Department several times, however the state noise laws do not govern gun fire.

Darwin Finkle of Gladstone Hollow Road- Opposed to the local law. Questioned whether or not this ordinance would affect gun fire on your own property. Supervisor Donnelly stated that it could.

Gerard Misk Attorney for Camp Nubar on Fall Clove Road- Mr. Misk indicated that a law very similar to the one proposed had been found unconstitutional in the NYS Court of Appeals, People v. NY Trap Rock Corp. There are too many subjective qualifications it would be impossible to enforce. The law should have something objective that can be measured.

Steve McQuide of Perch Lake Road- In favor of the local law. The camp on Perch Lake Road, is constantly using their loud speaker system even into the night. The Camp has not responded to any of the complaints from the home owners on Perch Lake.

Edward Callahan of Wolf Hollow Road- Opposed to the local law. He can hear the loud speakers from his home for Camp Nubar. Questions if there could be a compromise between this law and no law.

JoAnne Callahan of Wolf Hollow Road- Opposed to the local law. Indicated that she agreed that people's sensitiveness are quite different. When they came up here on the weekends only, noise bothered her a lot more and now that she is here full time, it just seems to be part of existence.

Suzanne Gladstone of Gamblicher Road- Opposed to the local law. The camps bring a viable income to this community and it is very important to us. Hopefully there can be a

compromise. Questioned if the board could sit down with the two camps and the complainants instead of putting in effect a local law like this.

William Day of Weather Tite Construction on Gladstone Hollow Road-Opposed to the local law. Concerned that the law will restrict the time that he is able to start work. In the summer he starts work very early, before the law would permit, to try and avoid the high temperatures while roofing, etc.

Three letters were received in regards to the local law all attached hereto.

A petition was also given to the town board against the local law with 99 signatures.

Supervisor Donnelly thanked everyone for coming and stated that before any action is taken everyone present will be notified.

Transfer Station Law-Began at 1:23PM

Bob Abbate- Is the new sticker system going to be free for residence?

The fee will be \$1/sticker.

Buffy Calvert- Will the stickers be distributed just because you are a tax payer or will you have to apply?

You will have to come into the Town Hall and see the Town Clerk or the Code Enforcement Officer to receive a sticker.

Mark Rossley- What are the town's average overage charges for C&D?

We are averaging \$2200-\$2400/Quarter, occasionally much higher.

Tina Moshier- Was this local law posted or advertised where people could see it? She was concerned that with the new law people would be dumping their trash on the side of the road instead of taking it to the dump.

Shayne Moshier- Why can't the town board sit down with Sue McIntyre at the county and renegotiate the contract we have with them? Why can't we get the money back for our recyclables, why does it automatically become the County's property?

Mark Rossley, Town Board Member for Bovina- Recommended the board to speak with Sue McIntyre and get your rates to go down. Some things that have been going to into the C&D bin, should be going into the normal garbage.

Bill Drew- Are we obligated to give the County the steel that is dumped in our transfer station?

You do not have to take it to the transfer station, but once it is at the transfer station it belongs to the County.

Maria Ditchek- She feels that contractors should pay more than normal residents.

Supervisor Donnelly called the meeting to order at 1:36PM.

Privilege of the Floor:

-Arnold Jones of NYS Taxation and Finance: Assessor Award and STAR Registration

Mr. Jones presented Assessor Tina Moshier an award for Excellence in Equity. He then gave a presentation on the new STAR registration rules. The new registration rules only apply to those with Basic STAR. If you have Enhanced STAR you should follow the same procedures as you have in the past. If you have not received a letter in the mail from NYS or have questions regarding your new registration please call (518)457-2036. A copy of the presentation given can be found on the town's website or in the Town Clerk's Office.

-Glen Faulkner of MTC: Renew the franchise agreement

Mr. Faulkner presented the Town Board with a Franchise agreement between the Town of Andes and Margaretville Telephone Company. This is a 10 year agreement that is set to expire in February 2014. The new agreement takes into account the new public service commission requirements. There now, only has be 15 homes per mile to continue on with cable service. The agreement ensures the proper insurance and allows the use of the town's right of way.

Councilman Gladstone asked if our bills could be analyzed to see if there could be a reduction in the cost of our phone bills. He also inquired if there was anything the telephone company could do to help get cell service in the Town of Andes. Mr. Faulkner indicated that there is something in the works, however a service provider has to be interested in coming to the area first.

- *Councilman Gladstone questioned who could be contacted in regards to the bottom of Beech Hill Road where it meets Route 30. It is getting to be quite a mess. McAdams said that he would contact DEP and see if they have plans in the works to fix this.
- **The highway department has also acquired two wing towers for the new Army Surplus trucks.
- ***Councilman Gladstone brought up the Town of Meredith and their use of p-stone in the winter. He feels that it is more abrasive and cleaner. McAdams said that it maybe, but it is more slippery, but maybe if it was mixed with sand it would work better.
- ****Councilman Gladstone and Highway Superintendent McAdams met with Dr. Chakar at the school concerning the shared use of the highway department's fuel tanks. Our system will need an upgrade. The school has offered to pay ½ the cost of this, which is estimated to be around \$3000-4000. If the board decides to move ahead with this it will begin in January 2014. We will do a volume bid and bill the school monthly.

Supervisor's Report

- 1.) We sent a letter to David Capps an Andes resident in reference to his request to use Ballantine Park next Community day as he did this year.
- 2.) Melvin Harrington spoke to Kim in reference to two positions to be filled in the Town that he saw on the Town's Website. Emergency management coordinator and the new position of Hazard Mitigation person. These are both non-paying positions. I offered the positions to him after I spoke to Fire Chief Joe Berghammer, and Richard Bell at the county. He was going to go in and speak to Kim on 9/30/2013. I don't know if he ever did or not.
- 3.) The Delhi Pool was reopened to the public on 9/20/2013.
- 4.) As a requirement of our Soils and Water grant for Ballantine Park, Birgetta Brophy the landscape architect did a power point presentation on 9/10/2013 at 6:30PM.
- 5.) On 9/10/2013 I received a letter from State Senator Seward that showed us what Andes received from the 2013 State budget. A 17.9% increase in state aid to Andes Central School, a \$2,000 grant to the Andes Library, and a 28.63% increase in state highway aid.
- 6.) On 10/3/2013 I received a check from the Army Corp of Engineers for \$299,000, this is part of the payment for the WWTP rehab.
- 7.) Today we had a public hearing on a proposed noise ordinance. This was preapproved by Tom Mills the Delaware County Sheriff as to the enforceability by his office.

- 8.) We have been working on our proposed Town Budget for 2014.
- 9.) On 10/4/2013 Marge Merzig wrote to us to confirm that while a budget workshop is open to the public no minutes are required to be taken. In fact unless the proceeding is fully transcribed it is inadvisable to pick and choose the facts to be recorded until a formal vote is taken.

The assessor salary was again discussed.

Councilman Gladstone felt that the assessor's salary should be comparable to other towns, with \$25,000 salary with a contribution to the insurance. He felt that we should take the bookkeepers advice from last year and lower it. He also suggested that this should be made into an appointed position to get this under control. After 6 years with 3% raises every year, it would be about a \$50,000 salary.

He also suggested that the 5% raise for the general budget employees should be lowered to 3%. Supervisor Donnelly stated that in previous years the general employees have always been given what the highway employees have received.

Councilman Grommeck felt that the assessor's salary should stay at the \$39,000 reduction that had been offered with full benefits.

Councilman Hall felt that the salary was still too high when combined with the benefits package.

Councilman Liddle agreed that it should be left.

Another budget workshop was scheduled for Tuesday, October 15th, 2013. This was changed to Thursday, October 17th, 2013 at 7:45PM due to a scheduling conflict at the town hall.

October 8, 2013

To the members of the Andes Town Board:

A potential noise ordinance in the town of Andes raises valid concerns. I've been a resident and taxpayer here for the past fifteen years, and I worry as much as anyone about being cited for using my lawnmower, hosting a rowdy midsummer cookout with friends, or harboring the world's most eager-to-bark dog. That said, surely there's a way to redress a persistent, unwelcome, and intractable source of noise pollution that I believe has no place in a rural residential community. An ordinance might pertain specifically to electronically amplified sound (both music and the spoken voice); doing so would not prohibit the common sounds of daily life and thus protect farmers and other private citizens from intrusive regulation.

My property is located on Perch Lake Road in Andes. My family uses it year-round as a weekend, summer, and vacation home, and we hope eventually to move here full-time. About six months after closing (in January 1999), we learned that a large nearby parcel with lake frontage had been sold to an owner who operates it as a children's camp. A website for the camp, L'Man Achai, bills it as an "overnight boys summer camp intertwined with the enriching experience of Jewish life."

From the very beginning of the camp's operation, its staff has displayed a flagrant disregard for the dozens of other residents on and around the lake. Most egregious is the insistent broadcasting of music and general announcements dozens of times a day (except for Friday evening and Saturday during the day), from sunup to after dark, over a network of loudspeakers. Even inside my house, with the windows closed, I can hear the noise from these loudspeakers. I need hardly mention how disruptive it is when I am in my yard or sitting on my porch. Catskills summers are short, and it's disheartening to be assaulted by noise when one yearns to be outside.

I believe that I speak for my neighbors as well as myself and my family when I say that these circumstances have profoundly affected the peace and tranquility of Perch Lake Road. Hostages to the noise, we feel powerless to curb its effects. I will sometimes leave my property for no other reason than to get away from the loudspeakers. I'm sure you're aware of the many studies that have catalogued the measurable effects of noise pollution on well-being. An article from www.medscape.com cites (among other things) the following: "Noise pollution may cause or contribute to the following adverse effects: anxiety, stress, nervousness, nausea, headache, emotional instability, argumentativeness, sexual impotence, changes in mood, increase in social conflicts, neurosis, hysteria, and psychosis. Population studies have suggested associations between noise and mental-health indicators, such as rating of well-being, symptom profiles, the use of psychoactive drugs and sleeping pills, and mental-hospital admission rates. Children, the elderly, and those with underlying depression may be particularly vulnerable to these effects

because they may lack adequate coping mechanisms. [1] Children in noisy environments find the noise annoying and report a diminished quality of life. [10,37]."

Because the noise from Camp L'Man Achai is intermittent, unregulated, and capricious, there's no way to anticipate when, or for how long, it will shatter the quiet. It's amplified by proximity to water (the camp is located next to a large lake that's shared by other residents). The decibel level varies: sometimes the speakers seem to be turned in one direction and sometimes in another, bellowing music and general announcements that are repeated multiple times. The unpredictability of the noise is as disheartening as the noise itself.

In the nearly fifteen years since the camp's operation, I have repeatedly approached members of its staff, as has my partner, Chris Moore. We've left messages when we're reached the camp's voicemail but have never had our calls returned. Sometimes no one picks up the phone at all. Both Chris and I have walked (and in two cases, driven) on to camp property to politely request that the loudspeaker be turned down, only to be met with blank stares. On three different occasions, we spoke with someone who identified himself as Yitzi. He told us the loudspeaker would be turned down, but on all three occasions, by the time we returned to our house only minutes later, it had been turned up even louder than before. The futility of our good-faith efforts over the years suggests to me that the camp is not interested in forging a cooperative relationship with us, and indeed, that it feels contempt for us and doesn't share our belief in treating people with common decency and mutual respect.

In July 2006, I wrote a letter to Sheriff Tom Mills about these difficulties, citing specific instances of the noise as well as our efforts to assuage it. Last summer, I spoke at length by phone to Marty Donnelly, with the same complaints. Both gentlemen were extremely sympathetic to my concerns, but neither felt I had any legal recourse. They advised me to approach the camp directly with a request for relief, which, as stated here, I have done many times with no discernible result.

To the best of my knowledge and belief, the camp is not licensed or chartered as either a synagogue or a school by the State of New York. The announcements it makes are secular in nature (referring to bus departure times, swim times, parent visiting days, and the like) and it seems clear to me that most of what takes place during the camp season – swimming, boating, fishing, hiking – does not constitute religious service. Thus I would argue that it is not subject to exception #1 listed in the proposed Town of Andes Noise Ordinance. As an Andes taxpayer, I believe I'm entitled to help from the board; I respectfully request that the code be sent to the Andes Council Attorney for legal interpretation.

It is my hope that a reasonable and enforceable noise ordinance for Andes will afford me and my neighbors some relief and allow us to enjoy our homes in peace.

To Whom It May Concern,

In the first place, the Public Hearing should be held in the evening when more people could attend, regardless of when the regularly scheduled Board meeting is.

Concerning the Proposed Law; in the first paragraph under the Title "Unreasonable Noise Prohibited" it is stated "It shall be unlawful for any person or organization to willfully make or continue, or cause to be made or continued, any loud, unnecessary, unreasonable or unusual noise, or to permit any other so to do, which disturbs the peace or quiet within the geographical boundaries of the Town of Andes, or which causes discomfort or annoyance to any reasonable person of normal sensitiveness." Many of us heat our homes with wood which was cut with a chainsaw and split with a wood splitter. According to the way this Proposed Law is written, both the chainsaw and wood splitter use would be prohibited because both make loud noise and disturb the peace and quiet.

Many people have a generator either portable or an Automatic Standby Generator. Both are noisy. If the electric goes off are we to expect the noise police to come to our door because someone complained? Automatic standby generators have a weekly exercise cycle where they start up and run for a set amount of time, again a loud noise. What happens if someone complains about this?

Delaware County and the Town of Andes have been known for agriculture for years; please refer to numbers 4 and 5 under "Unreasonable Noise Prohibited." People have moved here for many years for this very reason. In agriculture, cows moo, pigs oink, and roosters crow. Are you really trying to say that if somebody complains about the noise of Marty Liddle's cows that he has to get rid of them or at the very least find muzzles for them? Now I checked on the internet, and I cannot find muzzles for cows anywhere and God forbid they complain about the sound of milker pump because as near as I can tell by this law, Marty would be out of business.

My mother just completed treatment for Lyme disease. She keeps chickens to help eat ticks that carry diseases. It is a natural, non pesticide way of control, helping to control many insects with the benefit of fresh eggs to eat. You're going to tell her it is better for her to have Lyme disease because someone does not like the sound of her rooster or chickens?

A lot of contractors and people that do brush hogging start work by 6:00 a.m. in the summer so they can beat the afternoon heat. According to the way this law is written this would be illegal.

As to number 6, page two, many people repair their own vehicles to save money. This area sure isn't an economic hotspot and many of us are struggling just to get by. Therefore, anything we can do to save money, we will do.

I'm not sure why number 8 is even included as it is already a violation under The Vehicle and Traffic Law.

If your neighbor does not like you, this Proposed Law provides an easy way for them to legally harass you.

Basically after reading this Proposed Law it reminds me of killing a mosquito with a shotgun. Sure it works, but it is definitely overkill. If you have a problem with a camp and their loudspeaker system then deal with that, don't throw a blanket (such as this Proposed Law), at everything and hope it takes care of the problem.

Lastly, our local law enforcement agencies are stretched thin enough as it is, without asking them to be the Noise Police for the Town of Andes.

INSERT IN PREAMBLE PARAGRAPH ON UNREASONABLE NOISE:

"It shall be unlawful...person of normal senstiveness. Any sustained or repetitive noise measured at 90 decibels or above shall be deemed presumptively unreasonable and disturbing in relation to any location within the town from which such measurement is or can be made."

(OSHA and NIOSH consider this the threshold level for danger and discomfort). See http://www.gcaudio.com/resources/howtos/loudness.html

INSERT IN NUMBERED PARAGRAPH 2 DEFINING UNREASONABLE NOISE:

"...or public place, or emanating from a property proximate (within 500 feet) or adjacent to..."

comment: as it stands now, this provision only covers public property, and not adjacent or nearby private property.

ADD TO NUMBERED PARAGRAPHS DEFINING UNREASONABLE NOISE:

"11. The use of firearms of any kind, other than for licensed hunting activities, including sustained or repeated firing of pistols, rifles, shotguns or other firearms over a duration of five minutes or longer for any reason, shall be deemed presumptively unreasonable and disturbing."
