#### Supervisor's Report

1.) I have found a source of funding that would allow us to hire an engineer to do a study of the options that might be possible at no cost to our tax payers to help us alleviate the impact of future

flooding in our town. To qualify for this funding we must have a flood commission established of local residents. 1. Bud Gladstone Deputy Supervisor, 2. Frank Winkler Chairman of the Planning Board, 3. Tom Joyce Board Member, 4. Michael McAdams Highway Superintendent (Need a total of 7). There will be a joint meeting in January with the Planning Board.

- 2.) At the January 2015 Regular Board Meeting we will have a presentation on solar use and its application to our town by SUNY Delhi professor Jim Ellis. He will do an assessment of Town Buildings for us.
- 3.) The CWC has formalize a municipal assistance loan program and it is available to us and can be used to purchase equipment. The rates are 2% up to \$250,000 for 1 year, renewable up to 5 years. Banks are at 3% and 3.5%.
- 4.) Tom Joyce has arranged to have the water level dropped in the pool by John Andrews. This has been completed.

WHEREAS, the Local Law was presented to the Town Board at least 10 days prior to the Town Board meeting on December 9, 2014; and

WHEREAS, the public hearing on the proposed local law was held on December 9, 2014 at 12:45PM at the Town Hall; and

WHEREAS, the public hearing was properly noticed in the Town's official newspaper on December 4, 2014; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board reviewed and considered all public comments received on the proposed Local Law; and

WHEREAS, the proposed Local Law was on file for inspection at the Town Clerk's office prior to the hearing and during the public review process;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AS FOLLOWS BY THE TOWN BOARD OF ANDES, DELAWARE COUNTY, NEW YORK:

THAT THE Town Board of the Town of Andes hereby determines that the proposed Local Law, attached hereto and made a part hereof, is hereby adopted as a Local Law entitled "A local law governing the sale, application, and disposal of waste associated with oil and natural gas exploration, extraction and storage activities"

Re: Andes Local Law on "Frack Waste" and "Brine"

#### Background Information - Why this matters

So much "frack waste" from drill cuttings and wastewater is being produced by oil and gas drillers in Pennsylvania that the drilling companies are having difficulties figuring out where to dispose it.

Solid and liquid frack waste from the Marcellus shale formation is not only radioactive (because of high levels of naturally occurring radon in this particular shale formation), it is also chemically laden with toxins from both unlisted and unregulated hazardous chemicals used in the drilling process. This waste is unfortunately categorized by federal and state law as "industrial" rather then "hazardous." The "industrial" categorization allows the waste to be virtually unregulated as compared to the more strict standards which come with waste labeled "hazardous," thereby allowing shipment across state lines with little regulation.

In 2012 alone 1.2 billions gallons of frack wastewater were produced in Pennsylvania and 100 million gallons of this waste were trucked to Ohio for disposal.\* Those numbers are for wastewater only. Regarding solid waste, Pennsylvania has produced 35 million cu. feet to date and approximately 8 million cu. feet annually.\*\*

Schoharie, Tompkins, Westchester, Ulster, Orange, Putnam, Suffolk, Nassau, Rockland, Albany and Ondaga Counties in NY State have all enacted local laws to prohibit frack waste from entering their counties. The states of Connecticut and Vermont have done the same. Because of this PA drillers are now running short on options as to where they can dump this toxic waste and have been trucking it hundreds of miles to sites in Michigan, Ohio and West Virginia and as far away as Rochester in upstate NY. Unprotected communities much closer to PA are also their targets. We are less than 100 miles from the frack fields of PA and can't allow Andes to become one of these targets.

### LOCAL LAW NO. 3 2014

A LOCAL LAW GOVERNING THE SALE, APPLICATION, AND DISPOSAL OF WASTE ASSOCIATED WITH OIL AND NATURAL GAS EXPLORATION, EXTRACTION AND STORAGE ACTIVITIES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE TOWN OF ANDES TOWN BOARD AS FOLLOWS:

#### Section 1: Legislative Intent.

The toxins and radioactive materials found in hydraulic fracturing (hereinafter referred to as "hydrofracking") waste are detrimental to the public health and therefore should be kept off all roadways and Real Property in the Town of Andes and kept out of our drinking water. As a result of the significant public health risks associated with hydrofracking wastes, the Town of Andes Town Board finds it necessary to prohibit the introduction of such waste into treatment facilities and roadways located within the Town of Andes.

#### Section 2: Definitions.

As used within this Local Law, the terms listed below shall have the following meaning:

- 1. "Hydraulic fracturing" shall mean the fracturing of underground rock formations, including shale and non-shale formations, by manmade fluid-driven techniques for the purpose of stimulating oil, natural gas, or other subsurface hydrocarbon production.
- "natural gas extraction activities" shall mean all geologic or geophysical activities related to the exploration for or extraction of natural gas, including, but not limited to, core and rotary drilling and hydraulic fracturing.
- 3. "oil extraction activities" shall mean all geologic or geophysical activities related to the exploration for or extraction of oil, including, but not limited, to, core and rotary drilling and hydraulic fracturing.
- 4. "natural gas waste" shall mean:
  - a. any liquid or solid waste or its constituents that is generated as a result of natural gas extraction activities, which may consist of water, brine, chemicals, naturally occurring radioactive materials, heavy metals, or other contaminants;
  - b. leachate from solid wastes associated with natural gas extraction activities;
  - c. any waste that is generated as a result of or in association with the underground storage of natural gas:
  - d. any waste that is generated as a result of or in association with Liquefied petroleum gas well operations; and
  - e. any products or byproducts resulting from the treatment, processing,

or modification of any of the above wastes.

- 5. "oil waste" shall mean:
  - a. any liquid or solid waste or its constituents that is generated as a result of oil extraction activities, which may consist of water, brine, chemicals, naturally occurring radioactive materials, heavy metals, or other contaminants;
  - b. leachate from solid waste associated with oil extraction activities; and
  - c. any products or byproducts resulting from the treatment, processing, or modification of any of the above wastes.
- "application" shall mean the physical act of placing or spreading natural gas waste or oil waste on any road or real property located within the Town of Andes.
- 7. "Town of Andes" shall mean the Town of Andes, New York.

#### Section 3. Prohibitions.

- 1. The application of natural gas waste or oil waste, whether or not such waste has received a Beneficial Use Determination pursuant to 6 NYCRR Part 360, on any road or real property located within the Town of Andes for any purpose is prohibited.
- 2. The introduction of natural gas waste or oil waste into any wastewater treatment facility within or operated by the Town of Andes is prohibited.
- 3. The introduction of natural gas waste or oil waste into any solid waste management facility within or operated by the Town of Andes is prohibited.
- 4. The sale, acquisition, storage, handling, treatment and/or processing of natural gas waste or oil waste within the Town of Andes is prohibited.

## Section 4. Provision to be included in bids and contracts related to the construction or maintenance of publicly owned and/or maintained roads or real property within the Town Of Andes.

- All bids and contracts related to the purchase or acquisition of materials to be used to construct or maintain any publicly owned and/or maintained road or real property within the Town of Andes shall include a provision stating that no materials containing natural gas waste or oil waste shall be provided to the Town Of Andes.
- All bids and contracts related to the retention of services to construct or maintain any publicly owned and/or maintained road or real property within the Town of Andes shall include a provision stating that no materials containing natural gas waste or oil waste shall be utilized in providing such a service.

3.	The following statement, which shall be a sworn statement under penalty of perjury, shall be included in all bids related to the purchase or acquisition of materials to be used to construct or maintain any publicly owned and/or maintained road or real property within the Town of Andes and all bids related to the retention of services to construct or maintain any publicly owned and/or maintained road or real property within the Town of Andes "We, hereby submit a bid for materials, equipment and/or labor for the Town of Andes of The bid is for bid documents titled We hereby certify under
	penalty of perjury that no natural gas waste or oil waste will be used by the undersigned bidder or any contractor, sub-contractor, agent, or vendor agent in connection with the bid; nor will the undersigned bidder or any sub-contractor, agent or vendor agent thereof apply any natural gas waste or oil waste to any road or real property within the Town of Andes of as a result of the submittal of this bid if selected."

#### Section 5. Education of Town Employees.

The Andes Town Board, or any Committee appointed by the Town Board, is hereby authorized to develop policies, educational materials, and/or training courses for department heads and employees to ensure that all town employees are familiar with the provisions of this Local Law. A contractor or vendor shall construe nothing in this Section to excuse non-compliance.

#### Section 6. Penalties.

This law shall apply to any and all actions occurring on or after the effective date of this law. Any violation of Section 3 of this Local Law shall be an unclassified misdemeanor punishable by a fine not to exceed \$25,000.00 per violation and/or up to thirty days' imprisonment. Each sale, application, and/or acceptance of natural gas waste or oil waste shall constitute a separate and distinct violation.

#### Section 7. Severability.

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this local law or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity or circumstance shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, effect or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this law or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such order or judgment shall be rendered. To further this end, the provisions of this Chapter are hereby declared to be severable.

#### Section 8. Effective date.

This local law shall take effect immediately upon the filing with the New York State Department of State.

Dear Mr. Rictor,

The following is a summary of a recent phone conversation I had with Ms. Kathleen Vinlockinburg pertaining to the life-threatening intersection condition that exists in my community on Canada Hollow in Andes, NY.

First, thank you and your department for the recent repair of a drainage pipe at the intersection of Rt. 28 and Canada Hollow Road in Andes. (The site may not be completed as there is still an orange safety barrel with a non-working flashing light mounted on top?) Unfortunately, there still remains a very dangerous situation at this location...the Canada Hollow Road entrance itself.

The problem is as follows. Starting just a few yards south (on the east bound lane) is an extreme curve which creates a blind spot just a very short distance from the Canada Hollow egress point. There is absolutely no way for any driver exiting onto the highway to see oncoming traffic, especially going west, towards the town of Andes. Driving onto route 28 is a hair-raising experience. Trucks going east also have a difficult time because of their large wheel base. Some of my neighbors have likened it to playing Russian roulette with cars.

Regretfully, the current signage does not sufficiently warn west bound drivers; especially transients who are unfamiliar with local conditions -- many of whom exceed the speed limit of 35 MPH. The current signs warn only of "falling rocks", "bus turn- around" and "left side road intersection". These warnings are wholly insufficient for this particular situation. We have had accidents and countless near accidents at this intersection – one particularly close call just the other day with one of our residents. I'm sure that a thorough evaluation of this intersection would indicate that dramatic steps must be promptly taken to eliminate this danger. We want to prevent a serious accident or possible fatality.

Eliminating the blind spot would be the ideal answer and we feel sure this can be accomplished. Additionally, rethinking the existing warning signs to include any or a combination of the following: reducing the speed limit; adding a traffic caution light; installing a concave mirror on the west bound side -- are all relatively simple solutions that can be done quickly. Half the road has recently been re-paved, and new replacement drainage pipes have just been installed by the township. We are hopeful that the 2<sup>nd</sup> half will be complete in the Spring of 2015. As Secretary/Treasurer of the Canada Hollow Homeowners Association, a private community consisting of 17 homeowners at the end of Canada Hollow Road, (part of a total of approximately 40 homes on this road) as well as residing here for 30 years I have witnessed the traffic increase which, of course, heightens the chance of a catastrophic accident. Our members and neighbors are very fearful that this is inevitable unless changes are made soon.

We are therefore asking for a review and remedy to this situation. Please feel free to contact me at 845-676-4517 with any questions you may have regarding this matter.
