PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR:

Dave Ohman - Delaware Engineering

Mr. Ohman gave an update on the new Highway Garage. Attached is the paper work that Mr. Ohman went over.

Mr. Ohman further explained that: "Right now we are planning fuel oil from the stand point that it is available and reliable - you can count on it. The Town had previously looked in to putting a waste oil furnace in. But there were issues with actually having enough quantity to provide enough fuel for a building of this size as well as permitting to actually go out and collect those waste oils to bring back to the facility. So that has all been looked at before.

There will be in floor heat with some supplementary ventilation. With the roof design we have provided enough room for the servicing of tri-axle type equipment. There will be paving in front of the building.

With the State Codes in place - we can not put work pits in. We talked about doing lifts and a couple of other things. At this point we are just going to build the garage and then if at some point we decide to come in and do something else we could have a lift type system that would be fixed in the floor.

I think what many people do not know is that this has been in the thinking stage for two or three years now. I think that a lot of questions that people may have - have already been answered or thought of. What we are doing is moving forward with the plan that has been pretty well thought out and trying to balance what the Town wants and needs vs. what we can all afford. "

RESOLUTION for the CENTRAL CATSKILLS COLLABORATIVE

RES. #41

WHEREAS: New York State Route 28 is the major thoroughfare of the Central Catskill Mountains offering the traveler a unique experience of mountain scenery and clear waterways, complemented by historic hamlets -- and it is this combination of resources that gives the region much of its scenic and community character and is vital to the region's economy;

WHEREAS: Route 28 passes through the heart of Catskill Park, a resource created by an act of the State Legislature in 1904 and now encompassing approximately 700,000 acres, about half of which are lands of the Forest Preserve and held in the public trust;

WHEREAS: Much of the land in the Central Catskills lies in the New York City Watershed and provides unfiltered drinking water to some 9 million New Yorkers and the historic Memorandum of Agreement has enabled a series of partnership programs to further the mutual goals of watershed protection and environmentally sensitive economic development;

WHEREAS: The State of New York recognizes the importance of local governments and has committed to providing \$500,000 for a Central Catskill Mountains Smart Growth Program to support improvement projects that retain the vibrancy of the hamlets, villages, and town centers along the Route 28 Corridor, specifically in the Towns of Andes, Middletown, Olive, and Shandaken, and the Villages of Fleischmanns and Margaretville;

WHEREAS: These six Central Catskills municipalities share many of the region's unique resources and can mutually benefit by exploring cooperative approaches, engaging in intermunicipal discussions and identifying collective strategies and actions that support and enhance such shared resources;

WHEREAS: Numerous studies, reports, and conferences have focused on the Central Catskills and encouraged and promoted intermunicipal and regional planning, marketing, and development; and further, these efforts have put forth numerous recommendations, which have not been fully realized;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: In the spirit of cooperation, we the undersigned commit to working within the Central Catskills Collaborative (or other mutually determined name) through a bottom-up process that builds on local goals and objectives and engages in a regional dialogue focused on protecting and promoting the scenic, cultural, historic, and economic well being of the Route 28 Corridor and the Central Catskills;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: The signatories understand the Collaborative may conduct such activities, including but not limited to, identifying and pursuing specific actions to provide better access to natural and cultural resources; exploring design guidelines, signage coordination and incentives to preserve scenic character; utilizing joint marketing approaches and funding mechanisms to support qualified economic development; and incorporating advisory members, including individuals with related interests and/or individuals from groups such as chambers of commerce, public agencies, not-for-profit organizations, and other local governments;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: The signatories understand that passage of this resolution does not bind the undersigned municipalities in any way other than the above stated commitment;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: The <u>Town of Andes</u> will designate two members (one regular and one alternate) to serve on the Collaborative and the names of these designees will be made within one month of the passage of this resolution;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: Upon the formation of a Central Catskills Collaborative the Catskill Center for Conservation and Development will, on a regular basis, convene the group and facilitate the regional dialogue and next steps, as identified by the Collaborative.

1. On March 3, 2008 the Town of Andes was served papers that we are being sued by Argyle Farms & Properties. Town Attorney, David Merzig, is taking care of this matter.

2. On Feb. 28, 2008 the C.W.C. sent a ballot to the Town of Andes. I cast a ballot for Tina Mole, Wayne Marshfield and Len Utter to serve from Delaware County.

3. On Feb. 19, 2008, on behalf of the Town Board, I sent a follow up letter to the six towns & villages that are to be part of the Central Catskills Collaborative advising them that - based upon subsequent information that was received { after our letter of 1-29-08 & our Res. #38 } the Town of Andes can now support the resolution provided by the Catskill Center.

4. On Feb. 25, 2008 we received a letter stating the facts covered at the meeting called for the six communities. Only three community representatives could make the meeting due to bad weather.

5. I have asked Frank Winkler, Chairman of the Andes Town Planning Board, to suggest someone to serve on the Central Catskills Collaborative committee.

6. On March 3, 2008 we received a letter from the C.W.C. stating they cannot accept and pay any legal bills received for 2007. New York City has drained the legal fund.

7. Today we have held the SEQRA Public Hearing for our new highway garage. For those who said a new highway garage would never happen -- *we are on our way*!

8. On Feb. 20, 2008 we had a very good Re-Val presentation that was held at the Andes Fire Hall.

9. THANKS to Supt. McAdams and the Highway Crew for all of the hard work they have done to keep our roads open.

10. The WWTP is receiving a lot of grease into the plant as well as of a lot of water. The water is something the plant can handle. The grease is a problem that MUST be corrected. This has been going on since the plant has opened. Delaware Operations has been working a lot of over time to make sure that the plant does not break down.

1. WWTP Plant

• Plant effluent flows averaged 46,650 gallons per day for the month of February 2008, which is up 8,350 gallons per day from last month due to all of the rain and run off. Flows have increased significantly since September 2007.

2. SPDES Compliance/NYSDEC, NYCDEP

• The plant discharges of treated effluent to the Tremper Kill Brook; permit compliance for February 2008 did not met all parameters. On February 29, the Treatment Plant experienced an upset. See attached sheets.

3. Collection System

• High Street is being maintained as required.

Dear Ms. Ports,

Since September 2007 the Town Andes Wastewater Treatment Plant has been receiving increased flows the cause of which is suspected to be I & I related. The Town hired Northeast Pipeworks to perform cleaning and camera inspection of 3300 feet the sewer systems main lines. On Thursday February 21, 2008, eighteen hundred (1800) feet was completed the remaining work of fifteen (1500) feet to be scheduled at a later date. Since the cleaning, the facility slowly started experiencing settling problems which progressed to the point of effecting the micro-filtration's operation. Although the settleometers, for both SBR's, had results well within operating parameters the SBR tanks, themselves, did not settle like the desk top. A strong odor of a cleaning agent was apparent at the facility after the cleaning however Northeast Pipeworks reported that no cleaning agents are used in their process.

Shane Boice, Chief Operator, contacted Mike Soukup of Slack Chemical Inc. (on February 27) and asked for assistance in evaluating the effectiveness of the chemicals which were currently being utilized at the facility. By Friday; February 29, 2008 the decants from the SBR's had a significant amount of solids in it causing increase transmembrane pressure (TMP) of the micro-filters which in turn shortened the run times of these units. Mr. Soukup arrived at 11AM on this date and through his testing found that none of the chemicals on hand would allow floc to form nor settling to occur, this indicating to him that the contents of the tanks were too cationic and needed to be neutralized. This neutralization was achieved by using anionic polymer (N3100). After the neutralization, floc formed, the tanks settled and water clarity of the SBR decants dropped to 3.3 NTU from a 16 NTU, however once this decant reached the micro-filters the units shut down on high TMP and would only run for 22 seconds when restart was attempted; this was approximately 2: 30 p.m. on Friday, February 27th. The operators attempted to clean in place (CIP) the micro units but were unsuccessful. Mr. Boice left voice messages for you, Jamie Malcolm as well as Dennis Covello of the NYCDEP advising them of the situation. It should be noted that our composite sampler was set up to sample the effluent during this event and that all samples will be analyzed for all permit parameters

Memcor, manufacturer of the micro-filters, was contacted for guidance on the possible cause of the filters plugging and a possible solution. Memcor suggested; since the cause of the fouling had not been determined; to use triple the amount of chlorine in the cleaning solution in the filter. The cleaning mode did not work. However, because the SBR decant water must be used during the CIP process due to the volume of water the micro-filters required and at this point the filters would not process this water. Memcor also stated that cationic polymers (such as the alum and K2001 which have been used at the facility for four (4) years) have been problematic with their micro-filters.

The operational staff along with Mike Soukup from Slack Chemical Inc. manned the facility from 6 a.m. Friday February 29 to 6 p.m. Saturday March 1, 2008. During that time Mr. Soukup identified the right polymer blend to help settle and make the decant water filterable. At this point, voice messages were left at the NYSDEC & NYCDEP updating of the situation.

On Sunday March 2, plant personal covered the facility for six hours in the morning with checks throughout the day. It appears that the SBR tanks were slowly losing their charge, indicating something in the tanks was still inhibiting the effectiveness of the polymer. Large amounts of what appears to be aerated fat had been released which maybe the cause of the micro fouling.

On Monday March 3rd the plant personnel and Mr. Soukup manned the facility from 6 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. The charge of the tanks was corrected and expedited the delivery of the polymer for Tuesday morning. One micro-filter was able to CIP by using the very limited potable water system at the facility. Biomass appears to be very sluggish to dead.

On Tuesday March 4, 2008 plant personnel and Mr. Soukup manned the facility from 5:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. The new polymer was installed and the staff began cleaning of the sand filters. The micro-filters are still off line until sand filters are cleaned and second micro is cleaned.

At this time we are still investigating the cause of the lack of settling and eventual membrane fouling. Our focus is on the following areas:

- 1. Was the white fatty like substance found through out the plant caused by grease being released from the collection system cleaning? This system has a history of grease and oils in the influent. Even though there was very little foam on the tanks before the neutralization, there was a layer of growth on the walls of the tanks that contain grease & oil which was released?
- 2. The suspected I & I has decreasing influent temperatures. Is it possible that alum has become less effective and collected in the SBR tanks, eventually becoming an over dose (possibly aided by the addition of the K2001) which caused the inability to floc. And the neutralizing of the tanks caused a release of the alum that was in suspension which in turn fouled the micro-filters? This has some merit

because the pH in the SBR dropped after neutralization, alum and K2001 are acidic and the N3100 has a near neutral pH.

3. The samples collected during the event will be analyzed for all permit parameters. The sample of the fatty like substance collected will also be analyzed for oil and grease, surfactants and priority pollutants, as per Suzanne Ports request.

Once laboratory the analysis is complete we will forward a copy those results to you.

New Highway Garage

1. Background

The Town of Andes desires to construct a new highway garage building to replace the existing, dated and sizably outgrown building. The Town has retained Delaware Engineering to prepare contract documents for bidding and plans to publicly solicit bids for the construction of the new building.

2. Building Requirements

- Total of 8 garage bays; 1 work bay, 5 truck storage bays, and 2 drive through bays (55' x 210' = 11,550 Sqft). 22' high eave to accommodate service on large tri-axle trucks.
- Fully finished metal panels on the interior and exterior of the building (insulation in between panels)
- Highway superintendent office, Mens' and Womens' bathrooms, Record storage room, and a break/lunch room.
- Garage to be built on existing Town owned land, utilizing land space that is only necessary, that is, the Town would still like to use the area for material supply and storage.
- Building logistically designed and placed in order to allow for future expansion if the Town ever desires.
- New septic system and well to service the facility, meeting NYCDEP and NYSDEC standards and approvals.
- Be economically and environmentally friendly. Incorporating the use of NYSERDA approved fixtures and a high efficiency heating system (i.e., hydronic in-floor radiant heat)
- Provide working areas for vehicle and equipment repairs.
- Provide adequate room for tool and parts storage.
- Provide work bay air supply, air supply for pneumatic tool use.
- Provide ample storage and servicing of vehicle fueling needs, accommodating both gasoline and diesel fuels.
- Provide garage drainage; collection and storage of water and accidental vehicle discharged fluids. Utilizing a oil water separate and enabling the collected fluids to be truck pumped and removed off site by an outsourced company.

3. Schedule:

- $_{\odot}$ The Town would like the highway garage to be operational by late fall of 2008, capable for use during the winter of 2008-2009.
- Bidding the project by July of 2008.
- \circ Time frame from design, starting now, is approximately 3-4 months
- Bidding/Award, approximately 1 month
- \circ Approximate construction time is 5 months.

4. What regulations do you currently have or contemplate having in place to exercise local control over new wind energy projects? The Town of Andes currently has zoning and special permits/site plan review to regulate activities such as this within both the town and hamlet of Andes.

5. Please give specific examples of wind energy projects that have been prolonged by state or other outside interests. I am not aware of any at this time.

6. Please make any other comments or suggestions you wish to add. (Feel free to append additional materials or statements). I believe NYS should leave it up to the communities within the state (i.e. towns) to govern siting of wind farm projects, as well as, other major electric generating facilities. First, NYS is a home rule state. Second, many communities within NYS have land use tools that enable them to properly site generating facilities. Third, communities have competent individuals within their borders that can assist or be consulted with to site generating facilities (i.e. planning departments, engineers, etc.). Fourth, all communities within NYS have the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA), a very powerful tool to assist them in siting a project. Last, who better to site a project in a community then the community itself? Who knows the environmentally sensitive areas within a community, transportation issues, historic areas, economic issues, social issues, etc? This proposed approach would severely stifle community involvement and conflict with the SEQR process; it would be unethical.
